Rabies Vaccine and Deworming Requirements for EU/UK Entry

Please Read Carefully!

Rabies Requirements:

- The first rabies vaccination your pet gets after its microchip implantation or after any lapse in coverage is a “primary” rabies vaccination according to EU rules.
- A “primary” rabies vaccination is only valid for 1 year. Even if your pet is an adult animal and receives a 3-year vaccine, if it is a “primary” rabies vaccination according to EU rules, it is only valid for 1-year.
- Vaccine Manufacturer Recommended Immunity Period- All pets must wait at least 21 days, or the time designated by the rabies vaccine manufacturer prior to traveling to the port of entry after the primary vaccine. Some vaccine manufacturers recommend waiting 30 days for the pet to gain immunity.
- As there are numerous Rabies vaccines available it is recommended to wait 30 days to make sure you have reached the recommended immunity period to avoid any issues at the port of entry.
- Your pet must receive a booster rabies vaccination within 12 months from its primary vaccination. If your pet does not receive another rabies vaccination within 1-year of a “primary” rabies vaccination, it means the vaccination coverage lapsed and you must start over. Even if the vaccination coverage only lapses by a day, the next rabies vaccination is again considered a “primary” rabies vaccination, and it is only valid for 1-year.
- If your pet does get its next rabies vaccination within 1-year of a “primary” rabies vaccination, this “booster” rabies vaccination can be valid for 1-3 years, according to the vaccine manufacturer’s instructions.
- Your pet can travel to the EU less than 21 days or designated immunity period after a “booster” rabies vaccination, but then the previous (primary) rabies vaccination must also be included on the health certificate.
- If your pet is <16weeks old, please let us know as most of the EU countries will not accept pets of this age.

Return Entry to United States - Requirements

CDC Import Form

- For dogs that have been only in dog rabies-free or low-risk countries in the 6 months before U.S. entry, this is the only form that is needed.
- There is no cost for this form.
- Complete the form online. A receipt will be emailed to you upon submission of the form. You can print the receipt or show it on your phone.
- The receipt is valid for 6 months from when it's issued unless the dog visits a high-risk country or a different dog rabies-free or low-risk country during that time.
- The receipt can be used for multiple entries into the United States if the dog has not been in a high-risk country in the past 6 months.
- This form should be completed by the person importing (bringing) the dog into the United States (the importer, owner, or shipper).
- You can fill out the form on the day of travel. We recommend completing it a few days or up to six months before travelling from a dog-rabies-free or low-risk country, just to be prepared.

In addition to having a receipt for a CDC Dog Import Form:

- Dogs must appear healthy upon arrival.
- Dogs must be at least 6 months old at time of entry or return to the U.S.
- Dogs must have a microchip that can be detected with a universal scanner to identify them.

Fee Explanation for International Health Certificate

The following explains the fees associated with Animal Clinic of Chardon Accredited DVM to process paperwork for the Health Certificate.

International Health Certificate: \$355- paid directly to ACOC

- Physical exam for final Health Certificate (\$65)- this is per pet (if multiple).
- Final Certificate paperwork (\$290) which includes research, review of all documents provided and the preparation of all necessary forms. – (this fee is per certificate)

Additional Fees- these are required by the USDA to endorse the certificate and are separate from our fees.

- **USDA Endorsement Fee-** \$101- due at the time of final paperwork and paid directly to ACOC- this is what the USDA charges us to review and endorse the Final International Health Certificate.
- **Testing Certification Fees-** Some countries require additional testing (such as Rabies titer/FAVN testing etc.) The USDA does charge a fee to certify testing. The fees will depend on what testing and how many tests are required.
 - *Please be aware that if additional testing is needed then additional appointments within certain time frames will be needed. We will notify you and provide an estimate for any additional costs.*
- **Shipping Label-** \$50-100 (overnight) - due at the time of final paperwork.
 - We as USDA-accredited veterinarians can electronically issue health certificates and use VEHCS (Veterinary Export Health Certification System) to submit them to USDA for endorsement.
 - Some countries do not accept a digital certificate and will require the USDA to ink-sign and emboss the final health certificate. Your final health certificate will be returned to you by mail (a prepaid, pre-addressed return label will be uploaded with certificate submission). The endorsed health certificate must accompany your pet during shipment or travel.

The total cost will be approximately \$506-\$556
